On Thursday, February 9, 2023, the Ehime Maru Memorial Association (EMMA) held a remembrance ceremony for the 22nd Anniversary of the tragic sinking of the Uwajima Fisheries High School training ship Ehime Maru at the Ehime Maru Memorial in Kaka'ako Waterfront Park. The Ehime Maru suffered the loss of nine lives, including four students, two teachers, and three crew members after it was unexpectedly struck by the USS Greeneville submarine.

While none of the bereaved families and officials from Ehime Prefecture and Uwajima City were able to

JASH serves at the Administrator of the Ehime Maru Memorial Association and works to preserve the memory of the lives lost in this tragic accident and to maintain the memorial in perpetuity.

Scholars Selected for Hiroshima Peace Program

JASH is pleased to announce the selection of two Oahu high school juniors to receive our 2023 Hiroshima Peace Scholarship (HPS), funded by the Adventures in Japanese Peace Fund by Ms. Hiromi Peterson and Ms. Naomi Hirano-Omizo. Through a competitive selection process, one junior representing a public school and one representing a private school were selected for this scholarship.

Our 2023 scholars are: Ms. Reina Gammarino from Punahou School and Ms. Yuuka Brown, from Kalani High School. They will be accompanied by chaperone and JASH Program Specialist Ms. Christianne Ono.

Scholars Selected for Hiroshima Peace Scholarship

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The HPS program provides high school juniors residing on Oahu an opportunity to study peace-related resources in their community and to participate in an educational trip to Hiroshima, Japan, where they will explore the history and effects of World War II, engage in collaborative activities with students in Hiroshima, and share their peace messages in Hiroshima and Hawaii.

This scholarship program includes a 10-day trip to Hiroshima where students will visit the Peace Memorial Park and Museum, participate in events commemorating the August 6, 1945 bombing of Hiroshima, present their research projects at a Peace Forum for high school students, and experience homestays with host families and exchanges with Japanese students. Scholars will be received in Hiroshima by the Hawaii Heiwa Scholarship Committee, who are coordinating an inaugural program for Hiroshima students to be received in Hawaii in Spring 2024.

As part of their preparations for their summer study trip, our scholars and their friends and family volunteered with the Sadako Peace Projects at Pearl Harbor National Memorial, coordinated by JASH and Pacific Historic Parks. They taught visitors the story of Sadako Sasaki and her message of peace and reconciliation through the sharing of *orizuru* 'peace cranes'.

Visitors learned to fold their own cranes and also received cranes donated by students in Japan to further spread Sadako's wish for peace with their friends and family at home. Other Peacebuilders from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa's Matsunaga Institute; University of Hawai'i West Oahu; Hawaii Baptist Academy; and Farrington High School also joined in that day.

The Hiroshima Peace Scholarship was founded in 2009 by Ms. Hiromi Peterson and Ms. Naomi Hirano-Omizo, retired Japanese language faculty of Punahou School and coauthors of the "Adventures in Japanese" language textbook series, t o encourage young PEACEBUILDERS and strengthen relationships between Hawaii and Hiroshima. JASH took over administration of the program in 2021.

Rose Garden at Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park

For those of you who have visited the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park in Hiroshima, Japan, did you notice roses growing there? They are located in a small rose garden of probably about 100 roses next to the Children's Peace Monument.



The monument was created to commemorate Sadako Sasaki and the thousands of other children who died in the atomic bombing of Hiroshima and its aftermath. An inscription for the monument reads, "This is our cry. This is our prayer. For building peace in this world."

Very little information was found regarding the **Rose Garden at Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park** but it was determined that the roses were received from multiple sources over the years. Relationships that were established because of the bombing, garnered gifts of roses from Continued on Page 4

Youth Artists Spread Peace at Sadako Peace Projects

On March 25, 2023, JASH, in collaboration with Pacific Historic Parks, welcomed the cast of Ohana Arts' *Peace On Your Wings* as volunteers for our Sadako Peace Projects at Pearl Harbor National Memorial. *Peace On Your Wings* is inspired by the real-life story of Sadako Sasaki and her one-thousand paper cranes, sharing her message of courage, love, and peace.

The young artists, composed of talent from 6th-11th grade, spread the story of Sadako Sasaki and her message of peace and reconciliation by sharing *orizuru* 'peace cranes' with park visitors. They shared Sadako's story and powerful message and taught visitors how to fold their own peace crane.



Visitors were also encouraged to take home cranes donated by students in Japan to further spread the importance of peace with their friends and families at home. The cast also paid their respects at the USS Arizona Memorial and deepened their understanding of the events of Pearl Harbor.

To wrap up the morning, the cast performed songs from *Peace On Your Wings* in front of the USS Arizona Bell.

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20th Annual Japan Wizards Competition



Congratulations to the 108 students who represented 18 high schools from Oahu, Hawai'i and Maui at the 20th Annual JASH Japan Wizards Statewide Academic Team Competition (JWC) on Saturday, February 25, 2023 at UH Mānoa Campus Center!

Teams were comprised of three students each with a total of 36 teams competing. The student-teams were tested on their knowledge of various Japan-related topics such as art and culture, daily life and customs, economy, food, geography, history, politics and government, religion, U.S./Hawaii-Japan ties, and of course language. The theme for the 2023 competition was *Sister State/City Relationships between Hawaii and Japan.*

Students were divided into two levels: Level A or Level B, depending on their current Japanese language level. Level A students are enrolled in Japanese I or II, and Level B students are enrolled in Japanese III or IV.

In addition, JASH Board Director and Youth Education Committee Chair, Jean E. Rolles sponsored a fifth award for a trip to Japan in honor of her friend and fellow JASH Board Director, Dr. Michael Leineweber, who passed away in 2014. Dr. Leineweber was a loyal supporter of JASH who strongly believed in the educational programs that JASH conducts, especially those programs that encouraged exchanges between people from Japan and Hawaii.

In his memory, Ms. Rolles sponsored a team chosen through a random drawing during the JWC awards ceremony. To qualify for this drawing, the team must have scored at least 120 points and be in the top 20 scoring teams at the competition. The four teams who had already won Japan trips were not eligible for this drawing.

The winner of the **Dr. Michael** Leineweber award was: Waiakea High School, Level A.





Kapolei High School, Level B was also awarded a trip to Japan donated by a retired public school teacher, who chooses to remain anonymous. The donor expressed how her former students benefited from the JASH Japan Wizards Competition and requested that a second public school from Level B travel to Japan.

These six teams of three students and their advisors will travel to Japan to experience firsthand what they studied in the classroom and through independent research.

This year, students were also invited to create a video that illustrates how youth leaders can get engaged in developing or maintaining strong and meaningful sister state/city relationships between Hawaii and Japan. JASH received a total of 25 video entries, and 14 of those were selected as "finalists." Of these final 14, four were given top awards in the following categories:



Geostrategies in the Grassroots: *Powering to Sustainability*



On Wednesday, March 1, 2023, JASH, in partnership with the Sasakawa P e a c e Foundation and the National Association of

Japan-America Societies (NAJAS), convened for a panel discussion on **Powering to Sustainability** at the Hawaii Prince Hotel, Pi`inaio Ballroom. A networking reception followed the panel discussion for approximately 60 guests.

The war in Ukraine has created a great energy crisis being felt worldwide and it will have lasting effects for an indefinite period of time. Hawaii and Japan are particularly vulnerable due to our lack of natural energy sources and our reliance on imported energy.


Geostrategy in the Grassroots: Powering to Sustainability provided up-to-date information on energy security and how we can apply this information in Hawaii's quest to lessen our reliance on unsustainable imported energy sources. With electricity and gas prices at a record high, along with the already high cost of living in Hawaii and Japan imports over 80% of its energy resources, our distinguished panelists addressed topics such as:

- Japan and Hawaii reduction in their reliance on imported energy
- Alternative energy sourcing methods
- Climate action in Hawaii and Japan


We were honored to welcome our distinguished panelist from Japan, Mr. Takahiro Ueno, Senior Researcher & Research & Development Manager, Central Research Institute of Electric Power Industry (CRIEPI) who opened up the discussion. Mr. Ueno shared with the audience two pie charts.

Ms. Jane Nakano, Senior Fellow, in the Energy Security and Climate Change Program at the Center for Strategic & International Studies (CSIS) spoke about renewable energy resources such as Carbon Capture and Storage and referred to some of her recent work such as Geopolitics of Hydrogen in the Indo-Pacific Region and the Geopolitics of Critical Minerals Supply Chains.

Lastly, Ms. Connie Lau, former President and CEO and Director of Hawaiian Electric Industries, Inc. spoke about Hawaii as a leader in the quest for clean energy and decarbonization, and the signing of Hawaii's 2008 Clean Energy Initiative. This initiative helped Hawaii become the first state in the U.S. to adopt a 100% renewable energy mandate and carbon neutrality by 2045.

In addition, Hawaii has led the U.S. in regulatory reform, becoming one of six states to adopt performancebased utility regulation which allows the alignment of public policy objectives like clean energy, reliability and resilience, cost control and affordability with financial rewards for the utility.

Ms. Lau also spoke about the many challenges that both Hawaii and Japan face both politically and culturally in its quest for clean and renewable energy. For example, in both Hawaii and Japan, geothermal energy is a form of energy that is available. But in Hawaii, the native Hawaiian community strongly

opposes tapping into this energy resource due to cultural values and beliefs. In Japan, the hot springs are an important part of the entertainment and culture among the people and they too like the native Hawaiian community oppose to tapping into this energy resource.

We also welcomed new NAJAS President, Mr. Andrew Wylegala who took over from Mr. Peter Kelley on March 1, 2023. This was Mr. Wylegala's first event as the new NAJAS President.

2023 APCC Junior Ambassadors Named



JASH is pleased to announce the selection of four Junior Ambassadors (JAs) to represent JASH and Hawaii at the 35th Annual Asian-Pacific Children's Convention (APCC) in Fukuoka, Japan in summer 2023. This year will be the first year JAs will be able to travel to Fukuoka since the 2019 program due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The APCC is a cultural exchange program that deepens participants' appreciation for the cultures of other nations and regions, promotes mutual understanding and friendship, nurtures international awareness in young people, and works towards world peace and coexistence. It is hoped that the JAs will build an international network of friends. For the next several months, the four Junior Ambassadors—two boys and two girls, all aged eleven at the time of travel-will participate in a JASHdesigned training program for their Japan experience this July. In Fukuoka, the students will meet over 160 fellow Junior Ambassadors from over 60 countries and cities in the Asia-Pacific region in a global youth camp. This will be followed by a homestay where they will each live with a Japanese host family. It is our hope that our Ambassadors will mature into adults with a strong sense of social responsibility.

Bridge Club are APCC alumni organizations that are established to further offer and promote additional bridge-building and youth leadership initiatives.
