JASH Annual Gala & Silent Auction

The virtual presentation of our Annual Gala was appropriately themed *Mirai* "Our Future" as we faced unprecedented challenges to find ways to remain relevant in our community and beyond.

Contestants learn about their Japanese heritage, improve their poise and public-


