He served as a Strategic Advisor to Franklin Templeton, the Chertoff Group and to Hedgeye Risk Management. From September 30 – October 4, 2022, eight students from various Ehime high schools traveled to Hawaii to participate in a cultural exchange hosted by the Ehime Prefectural International Center (EPIC). EPIC promotes cultural understanding and international cooperation through various programs and exchanges. Since 2013, EPIC has organized this exchange program that annually sends students from Ehime to Hawaii, but it was transformed into online meetings via Zoom for the past couple of years due to the pandemic.

On their last full day in Hawaii, they visited Punahou School to experience school life in Hawaii and give presentations about their hometowns, culture and school activities. In the afternoon, they had an exchange meeting with Moanalua High School Japanese Club members led by Jaimelynn Tateyama Sensei, who is a former EPIC intern.

Sadako Peace Projects—Peace Building Initiatives

On November 19, 2022, JASH and Pacific Historic Parks (PHP) hosted high school and college volunteers at the Sadako Peace Projects (SPP) at the Pearl Harbor National Memorial. This is the first time the SPP have been held since 2019 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and it is also the first time JASH has had the honor of running the projects since becoming their administrator in 2020.

JASH and PHP welcomed volunteers from Punahou School, led by Academy Japanese language faculty Junko Ady, as well as volunteers from the Peace Sustainability and Advocacy student club and Matsunaga Institute of Peace at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, led by Educational Specialist José Barzola. We were also honored to have in attendance project cofounders Hiromi Peterson and Naomi Hirano-Omizo, former Japanese language faculty at Punahou School, and co-authors of the Adventures in Japanese language textbook.

Additionally, Peterson-sensei is a recipient of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan's Foreign Minister's Commendation for 2022 for her dedication and achievements in the fields of language pedagogy and peace education. Peterson-sensei and Omizo-sensei are also co-founders of the Hiroshima Peace Scholarship for high school juniors, which is launching its first cohort under the administration of JASH for summer 2023 (learn more jashawaii.org/hps).

The Sadako Peace Projects include two peacebuilding initiatives held at the Pearl Harbor National Memorial: The Sadako Project, founded in 2014, and the Sadako Peace Cranes Project, founded in 2016.

Through the Sadako Project, volunteers teach visitors to Pearl Harbor about the story of Sadako Sasaki, a young girl who was a victim of the Hiroshima atomic bombing and who would pass away from the effects of irradiation when she was twelve years old. In memory of Sadako's thousand paper cranes, visitors are invited to fold peace cranes bearing their own hopes for world peace.

In the Sadako Peace Cranes Project, teachers in Japan are invited to share the story of Sadako, World War II, and the importance of peace with their students. As part of the lesson, Japanese students fold peace cranes containing their messages of peace. Our local volunteers share these

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cranes with visitors to Pearl Harbor, letting the cranes "spread their wings" and share their messages of

JASH held its Fall 2022 Japan Day program sponsored by the McInerny Foundation and the Freeman Foundation during the months of November through December via interactive video tutorials. We featured bon dance, calligraphy, hanafuda, ikebana, karate, manga, minyo/shamisen, Peace Studies/Sadako Sasaki Story, soroban, and tea ceremony.

Approximately 550 students from Aiea High School, Hilo High School, Kalaheo High School, Nanakuli High School, McKinley High School, Mid-Pacific Institute, and St. Andrew's Schools participated in the virtual Japan Day program in fall 2022. Held twice a year, Japan Day is JASH's longest running educational program which is offered free to Hawaii's middle and high schools. Since its inception in 1993, over 8,100 students from 67 different public and private schools have participated in this educational event.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Japan Day program has been offered virtually since Fall 2020 so that students can experience Japanese culture and art remotely from their classrooms. Thanks to our volunteer instructors, we were able to expand the selection of Japanese cultural activities to include an introduction to manga, minyo/shamisen, and hanafuda this time in addition to eight video segments on bon dance,

peace across the world. During this project day, cranes were shared with many visitors from around the U.S., ranging from California all the way to New York. We also shared Sadako's story with visitors from Canada as well as travelers all the way from Spain!

Through the Sadako Peace Projects, we hope to connect the people of Hawaii, Japan, and around the world to establish friendships and crosscultural understanding, raise awareness of the consequences of

war, and build a more peaceful future.

We'd love to have your class, club, or organization volunteer for the Sadako Peace Projects! Individual volunteers are also welcome. Volunteers must be at least of high school age; volunteers under 18 must receive parent/guardian permission. The projects run semi-monthly during the academic year. The links for these video segments were shared with the schools invited to participate in the Japan Day program. Generous funding from the McInerny Foundation and the Freeman Foundation has enabled JASH to produce high-quality videos of select Japanese cultural activities and expand the Japan Day program to include more schools, thereby impacting more students.

Through virtual Japan Day, students are encouraged to follow the video lessons and get hands-on experience in Japanese arts and culture by participating in the activities while they watch. Japan Day also illustrates how art and culture in different societies can influence and enhance people's lives, and how these

cultural values are perpetuated by devotees of the arts.

A student from Aiea High School wrote in the post-program survey, "Learning about the different topics was really enlightening and I was constantly engaged with all the videos because all the presenters did a good job presenting."

Disaster Preparedness & Quick Recovery in Hawaii

On Tuesday, December 13, 2022, JASH in partnership with Keidanren U.S.A., the Consulate General of Japan in Honolulu and the East-West Center convened for a seminar on Disaster Preparedness & Quick Recovery in Hawaii at the Hawaii Imin International Conference Center. A networking reception followed the seminar for nearly 70 guests.

Based on Hawaii and Japan's shared experience as island communities, this seminar gathered experts from both regions to discuss the topics of disasters and recovery.

Expert panelists presented and discussed what has been learned from past disasters and how this information is shaping the ways we prepare for future disasters in their respective fields, including but not limited to technology, utilities, communication and the insurance industry. During the second half of the panel discussion, experts presented and discussed how recovery efforts are evolving and shared some of the innovations being developed for preparedness and recovery.
