On October 4, 2023, JASH had the honor of hosting the Japan-U.S. Military Program (JUMP) at the official residence of the Consul General of Japan in Honolulu.

Newly-appointed Consul General Yoshinori Kodama arrived in Hawaii just days before the event on October 2, 2023. Consul General Kodama graciously opened his home to over 200 JUMP guests which included military service members, civilian government contractors who served in Japan and service members from the



Japan Maritime Self-Defense Force (JMSDF) ship the JS Kashima.

Being able to hold this exclusive event at the Official Residence of the Consul General of Japan in Honolulu exemplifies and reinforces the special relationship we have both locally and nationally between Japan and the U.S. After being at sea for five months and visiting 11 ports before returning to Japan, Hawaii was the final port for the JS Kashima.

Mahalo to America-Japan Societies in Japan for Supporting Maui Wildfire Victims



Our hearts go out to the many victims of the devastating wildfires that occurred in upcountry Maui and Lahaina on August 8, 2023. In a showing of loyal support from our friends in Japan, members of the National Association of America-Japan Societies (AJS) began coordinating a large-scale fundraising campaign in September 2023 to help the victims of the disaster.

Through the course of the next few months, over 6,783,000 yen (or the equivalent of \$46,075) was collected

from members of the America-Japan Society in Yokohama, Fukuoka, and Kumamoto, as well as members of the Tokyo American Club.

A majority of the funds collected (approximately \$36,300) was forwarded to the Hawaii Community Foundation's Maui Strong fundraising campaign. A small portion was also given to three Japanese temples in Lahaina which sustained damage: Honpa Hongwanji; Lahaina Jodo Mission; and Koyasan Shingon Mission of Hawaii.

This outpouring of support from our allies across the Pacific Ocean comes as no surprise as relations between

Peace Cranes Take Flight at Pearl Harbor

Once a month, throughout the academic year, JASH in collaboration with Pacific Historic Parks (PHP), hosts the Sadako Peace Projects at the Pearl Harbor National Memorial.

For the fall 2023 semester, student and community volunteers joined JASH and PHP on October 28 and November 18 to share the story of Sadako Sasaki and her hope for world peace with memorial visitors.

Visitors not only get to learn how to fold their own peace cranes, but they can also take home cranes folded by students in Japan! These donated cranes are folded and sent to JASH as part of lessons on World History and Peace Studies and are coordinated by teachers in Japan.





For the October 28 workshop, we were joined by students from Pearl City High School, Kalani High School, the East-West Center, as well as community volunteers. Visitors who stopped by our booth came from all over the U.S., including Rhode Island, Florida, Michigan, and California. We also met families from China, England, Brazil, and even Japan!

On November 18, we were joined by students from Ohana Arts' production of "Peace on Your Wings," a youth musical about Sadako Sasaki. Over the summer, the cast traveled to Hiroshima to perform the musical for an international audience.

Earlier in November, these students also performed the musical for local audiences at Moanalua High School. In addition to the "Peace on Your Wings" cast, we were also joined by 2023 Hiroshima Peace Scholar Reina Gammarino, as well as other students from Punahou School and Moanalua High School!

We shared peace cranes donated by Kodaira Nishi High School in Tokyo, Moka Hokuryo High School in Tochigi, and Satsukigaoka High School in Hiroshima.



EPIC Students Visit Hawaii

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EPIC and Mr. Kazuki Takemiya, English Teacher from Imabari West High School accompanied the students as they visited various sights on Oahu. The delegation visited sites such as the Ehime Maru Memorial, University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, and local high schools.



The Ehime students participated in a two-day homestay program with students from Punahou and St. Louis Schools over the weekend. On their last full day in Hawaii, the girls visited Punahou School and the boys visited St. Louis School. They experienced a sampling of school life in Hawaii and gave presentations regarding their hometowns, culture, and school activities.

After their presentations, they had some time to converse with local students in both English and Japanese. In the afternoon, they had an exchange with members of the Japanese Club at Moanalua High School.



JASH was happy to partner with EPIC to bring this cultural exchange program to Hawaii once again this year. We helped lay the foundation for interaction with students from Ehime and Hawaii and it is our hope that the friendships that they established will continue for many years to come.

Students Experience Japanese Culture at Fall Japan Day

On November 2, 2023, JASH held its Fall Japan Day program, sponsored by the McInerny Foundation and the Freeman Foundation. Approximately 200 students from Kalani High School; Kapaa High School; King Kekaulike High School; Konawaena High School; Pearl City High School; St. Joseph School; University Laboratory School; Waiakea High School; and Washington Middle School gathered at the Japanese Cultural Center of Hawaii's Generations Ballroom to enjoy the day's activities.

Held twice a year, Japan Day is JASH's longest running educational program which is offered free to Hawaii's middle and high schools. Since its inception in 1993, over 7,800 students from 67 different public and private schools have participated in this educational event.

Japan Day had been held virtually for the last few years due to the pandemic, so we were very excited to bring it back in-person for the first time since Fall 2019. Generous funding from the McInerny Foundation has enabled JASH to expand the Japan Day program to



include more schools, thereby impacting more students. Additional funding from the Freeman Foundation allowed more neighbor island schools to participate as well.

The morning started out with a lively taiko demonstration by the Taiko Center of the Pacific. Following the Opening Ceremony, students attended four of the eight cultural sessions presented by nearly 40 volunteer-experts on Bon Dance, Calligraphy, Ikebana (flower arranging), Karate, Kendama, Origami, Soroban (Japanese abacus), and Tea Ceremony.

Following the Japan Day program, neighbor island students from the Big Island, Kauai, and Maui were given private gallery tours of the Japanese Cultural Center of Hawaii's exhibit, Okage Sama De: I am What I am Because of You. Neighbor island schools also visited other areas on Oahu, including Stix Asia and Byodo-In Temple, before flying back to their respective islands.

Japan Day provides students with hands-on experience in traditional Japanese arts and culture while reinforcing and complementing what is

taught in the classroom. A student from Pearl City High School wrote in the post-program survey, "I had a lot of fun! I got a chance to get a deep dive into aspects of Japanese culture that I likely never would've on my own, some of which I'd never even thought or heard of! Each lesson was engaging and informative..."

Japan Day also illustrates how art and culture in different societies can influence and enhance people's lives. A student from University Laboratory School commented, "It was a fun, interactive experience that taught me about the traditional art forms and activities in Japan. I enjoyed participating in the ones (activities) I
